SOROPTIMIST INTERNATIONAL NEWS

2007's President's Appeal was for a project called "Restoring Dignity." This is a project to assist girls/young women in Ethiopia who have suffered the trauma of obstetric fistula.

Obstetric fistula develops when blood supply to the tissues of the vagina and the bladder (and/or rectum) is cut off during prolonged labor. A hole develops through which urine (and/or feces) pass uncontrollably. Because of the fistula the women suffer physical damage to their bodies but even worse is the psychological trauma as they become outcasts from their society. Their husbands desert them, especially if it is a first baby. Often these girls are as young as 15 or 16 years old. Their family, neighbors and friends avoid them because of the odor. No one would employ them either.

Donations from the Project go to improve those who cannot be completely cured and need on-going medical care. They encourage independence and improve the morale and self esteem of the permanent residents of the Addis Ababa Fistula Hospital through the self-

help rural village "Desta Mender."
